Water and Energy Efficiency?

Make the Drops-to-Watts Connection

Being water and energy efficient provides a wide range of benefits—for utilities, consumers, businesses, and the community as a whole. Using less water means moving and treating less water, which helps reduce the strain on water supplies and drinking water and wastewater infrastructure.

Delivering water and wastewater services is also energyintensive, as the water is treated, pumped to homes and businesses, then pumped to wastewater facilities to be treated again. EPA estimates 3 to 4 percent of national electricity consumption, equivalent to approximately 56 billion kilowatts, or \$4 billion, is used to provide drinking water and wastewater services each year.

Water and wastewater utilities are typically the largest consumers of energy in municipalities, often accounting for 30 to 40 percent of total energy consumed. Implementing energy efficiency measures at water sector systems can significantly reduce operating costs.
